




Historical Landmarks



- First president to <u>NOT</u> be re-elected
- Last Federalist president
- Kept the nation out of war (diplomacy)
- Increased the Army and created the Navy
- Puts the Constitution to the test

John Adams & France





XYZ Affair

Adams sends 3 delegates to France to stop French attack on our American Ships

- Pinckney / Marshall / Gerry
- Want to negotiate and stop attacks on US Ships
- Three French agents referred to as X, Y, and Z

Demand a bribe of \$250,00

"Millions for defense but not a sixpence (6 pennies) for tribute."

- Americans are outraged!
- Federalist LOVE this attitude against FRENCH
- America wants WAR

Alien & Sedition Acts



- Federalists' fear France
- Mistrust French immigrants
- They might bring dangerous ideas & will back those who support French (Democratic Republicans)
- Adams decides they need to control situation and those (immigrants) who support DR who sympathize with France

French Americans

A. Shut the borders and stop French Immigration.

B. Let them in but, make it more difficult for foreigners to become U.S. Citizens.

C. Make a law that lets the president throw anyone out of the country that he wants.

Alien & Sedition Acts

Alien Acts

- Changed the duration to become a citizen from 5 years to 14 years. (Naturalization Act)
- Prevent French immigrants from becoming voting citizens.
- President can deport or imprison any alien he thinks is dangerous




The Spitting Lyon

Alien & Sedition Acts

Sedition Acts

- Illegal to criticize the president and/or the government.
 - No speeches
 - No news articles of flyers
 - No meetings
- Those found guilty will be fined or jailed.



States Exercise Their Rights

States decide Alien & Sedition Acts are unconstitutional.

- Violates the first amendment
- Supreme Court really isn't established.




James Madison & Thomas Jefferson

Should there be a question added to the 2020 census asking people if they are a U.S. Citizen?







- John Jay 1 (F)
- Charles Pinckney 64 (F)




House of Representatives

Terrible Mudslinging

votes 36 times before Jefferson is declared the winner.

Aaron Burr is the Vice President



Federal judges were appointed by John Adams at the last minute.

President Adams is said to have been signing appointments up until the midnight of his last day in office.

All of the appointments were delivered with the exception of 58



Madison vs. Marbury

Jefferson tells his Secretary of State to lose the last 58 appointments.

One of the 58 is William Marbury. He sues Madison for losing his appointment.

JUDICIAL REVIEW





John Marshall - Chief Justice establishes the role of the Supreme Court.

Judicial Review - Gives the Supreme Court the power to strike down laws that are unconstitutional. Final say on the law.
