John Locke - 1690

- Examined the way men formed governments
- Natural Rights Human beings have natural rights including life, liberty, & property
- These rights are <u>inalienable</u> can't be taken away.
 They are from God.
- Did not believe God gave Kings the divine right to rule.
- People form governments to protect their rights
- Right to Revolution If government violates the rights, people have the right to rebel

Bacon's Rebellion - 1675

- Wealthy farmers bought all the good farmland in Jamestown
- Nothing left for young or poorer farmers to start farms
- Young or poor had to work as servants for wealthy
- Moved west and wanted to go to war with Natives to secure more land
- Governor won't support because of the fur trade with natives & doesn't want to create competition for wealthy farmers
- Raids begin. Governor declares them rebels.
- Burn Jamestown starting with the House of Burgesses.
- Believe that they have a right to rebel against a government that doesn't care for them.

The Great Awakening (1730-1743)

- Religious focus of the colonies faded
 - Great Awakening revived faith in the colonies
 - Focus was on the consequences of sin
 - Sermons were not read / More of a production to engage the people
- Message was delivered by traveling preachers who went from town to town
 - Caused people to break away from their traditional churches and join new ones
 - Some churches split between
 - Democratic thought and freedom of religious beliefs



The Navigation Acts - 1733

- Mercantilism Colonies exist to make the mother country wealthy
 - Colonies were a source for raw materials
 - Colonies should be a market for goods



- Navigation Acts supported mercantilism
 - Any European country selling goods to the colonies had to stop in England & pay a tax first
 - 2. Only British ships (built & owned) could ship colonial goods
 - 3. The colonies could only sell certain goods like tobacco and sugar to England, no one else
- Colonist felt they could do better if they could buy and sell form who they pleased and use ships of their choice.
 - Colonist cheated the system by <u>smuggling</u>, importing / exporting goods illegally

The Zenger Trial - 1734

- A newspaper publisher John Peter Zenger became upset with the governor of New York.
 He published a series of articles criticizing the governor
- Criticizing the government was considered a crime
 - His newspapers were burned
 - He was brought to trial
- His lawyer argued that because his criticism was true he couldn't be punished. The jury agreed.
- This supported <u>Freedom of the Press</u> in the colonies
